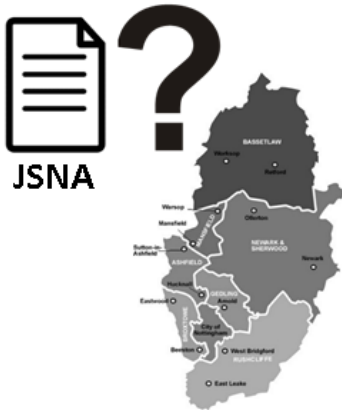
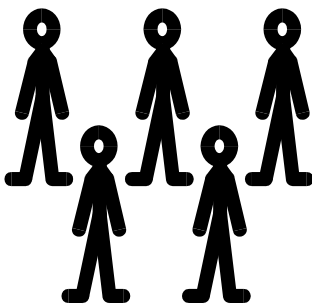




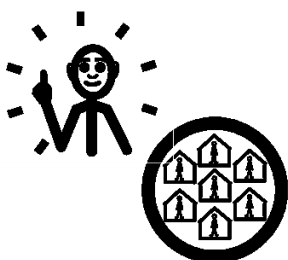

**This document is about understanding the health, care and wellbeing needs of Adults with learning disabilities living in Nottinghamshire.**

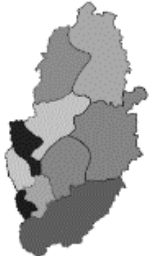


The Joint Strategic Needs Assessment collects information about local communities.

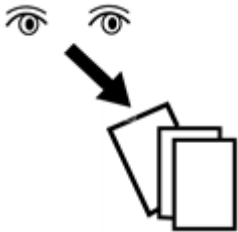
It helps us to understand the needs of people living in Nottinghamshire now and in the future.



The assessments are done across the country which helps us compare Nottinghamshire to what is happening in other parts of the country.



Collecting this information helps us to understand how well Nottinghamshire is doing and what we need to do to be better.



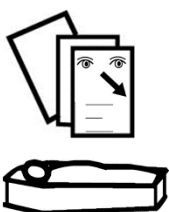
The full report for Nottinghamshire gathers lots of information including:



- People going into hospital



- Health Checks



- Mortality rates



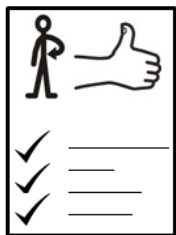
- Housing



- Transforming Care-This is about improving health and care services so that more people can move from a hospital setting to live in the community, with the right support and close to home.



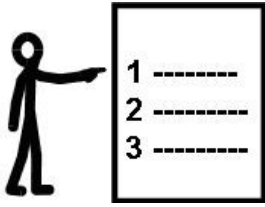
- Employment



- Outcomes-How well services help people achieve the things that are most important to them.

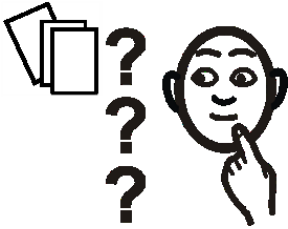


- Talking to service users and carers through groups such as the Learning Disability and Autism Partnership Board.

These are called recommendations, they say what we need to do.



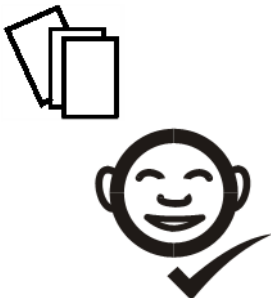

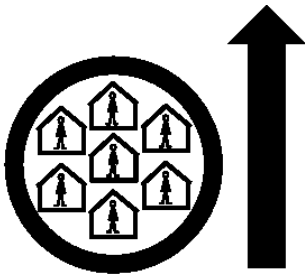
This report is easy read and tells you what we think should happen in Nottinghamshire.



## What we know about people with learning disabilities living in Nottinghamshire.



There are around 16,000 adults with a learning disability living in Nottinghamshire.



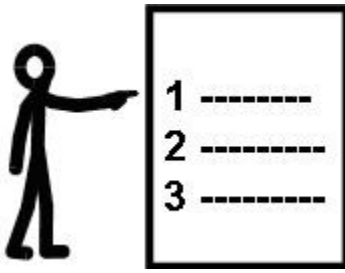
### Will the number of people change?

Yes, we think the number will go up.

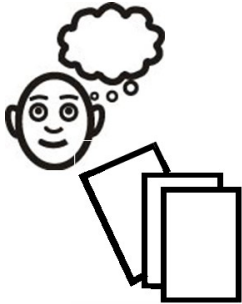
We think the number of people over 65 in particular will go up.



We think the number of people with a moderate or severe disability will go up a little.



**All the information we collected has helped us decide on 11 recommendations for Nottinghamshire.**



### **Number 1**

All the plans that different services write must think about the needs of people with learning disabilities now and in the future.



### **Number 2**

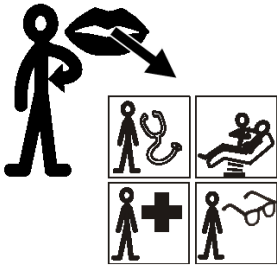
We must carry on making sure we are good at recording local information.

This helps us compare Nottinghamshire to other parts of the country. This helps us know what we are doing well and what needs to be better.



### **Number 3**

We need to find the people and organisations who can work together to create more employment opportunities for people with learning disabilities.



## Number 4

Together we need to make sure there is accessible health information along with good opportunities for people to talk about their health.



## Number 5

We need a better understanding of the support needs of people with learning disabilities in the criminal justice system.



## Number 6

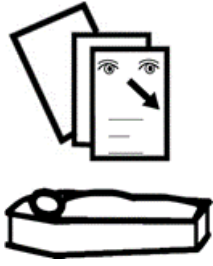
We need to review what we have learnt from the Transforming Care Partnership which is supporting people to move from living in a hospital setting to living in the community.

We need to use what we have learnt to also support the planning of care for people with learning disabilities across Nottinghamshire.



## Number 7

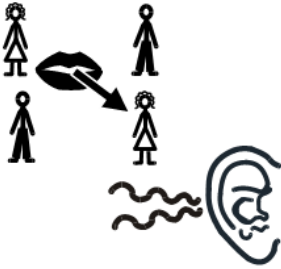
We must carry on making sure that health and care services are joined up and work together to support people with learning disabilities.



## Number 8

Reports show that people with learning disabilities sometimes die younger than other people. We need to stop people with learning disabilities dying too soon.

We must do more reviews that look into the reasons someone with a learning disability has died. This is called the Learning Disability Mortality Review or LeDeR.



## Number 9

Future service planning needs to make sure people with learning disabilities and carers are involved and listened to. For example using groups such as the Learning Disability and Autism Partnership Board.



## Number 10

We must make sure that people and organisations are better at planning and working together to help services meet people's outcomes and needs.



## Number 11

We need to find out why some parts of Nottinghamshire do fewer health checks than others and support these areas to do better.



## What next?



There will be an action plan saying how we will work together to make the changes needed.
